Hunter Recruitment, Retention, and Reactivation: Learning to Hunt Spring Turkeys

From May 25 to May 26, 2019, 12 participants attended Vermont's first-ever Learn to Hunt Spring Turkeys program. Presented by the Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department, National Wild Turkey Federation, L.L. Bean, and Backcountry Hunters and Anglers. This "adult educational weekend" approached hunter education in a fully immersive manner, offering hands-on learning experiences culminating in a mentored hunt. The program was held at NorthWoods Stewardship Center in East Charleston, VT.

Enrolled students' motivations ranged from curiosity about where their food comes from to interest in self-sufficiency, woodsmanship, and the willingness to try something new.

For most of the students, it was their very first hunting experience. For many, the spring woods coming alive and the thrill of hearing a turkey gobble in the early morning countryside was enough to make the day worthwhile. While no birds were taken, all hunters agreed that the shared excitement of being "out there" and drawing upon all they learned together over the weekend was unforgettable.
