# **Executive Summary**

The University of New Hampshire Survey Center conducted a survey of Vermont and New York waterfowl hunters on behalf of the Vermont Fish and Wildlife Department and the New York Department of Environmental Conservation. Some of the survey questions were replicated from a similar survey conducted in 2015. A stratified sample of 6,581 waterfowl hunters were invited to take the survey by mail, email, text, and phone call. Between August 15th and October 8th, one thousand, four hundred and thirty-two (1,432) hunters took the survey with eight hundred seven (807) being qualified to complete the entire survey. More details on survey methodology and the response rate can be found in the technical report. The following figures display survey results for each question. Appendix A contains detailed tabular results, Appendix B contains the open-ended responses, and Appendix C contains the survey instrument. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%.

## **Key Findings**

### **Waterfowl Hunting Effort and Harvest**

All respondents say that they hunted waterfowl in their own state in the past five hunting seasons while one in five Vermont residents have hunted waterfowl in New York and a similar amount of New York residents have hunted in Vermont. Three in four respondents have hunted in the Lake Champlain Zone and half have hunted in the Interior Vermont Zone while only one in eight have hunted in the Connecticut River Zone. Nearly two-thirds of respondents say they hunt waterfowl every year and respondents on average spend 8-9 days in their respective hunting zones each year. Nearly half of respondents say they hunt ducks and geese equally while two in five primarily hunt for ducks and just one in eight primarily hunt for geese. Nearly half of respondents mostly hunt on weekends, two in five hunt equally between weekdays and weekends while one in eight hunt mostly on weekdays. Only fifteen percent of respondents say they find waterfowl bag limit regulations difficult to understand. Most respondents don't have a preference when it comes to greater/lesser scaup bag limits, but those who do have an opinion are relatively divided on their preference. The large majority of respondents devote at least one day in an average hunting season to Canada geese and dabbling ducks while about half do so with diving ducks. Relatively few respondents devote at least one day to snow geese, mergansers, and brant in an average hunting season. Respondents are most likely to hunt in the regular migratory Canada Goose season while just over half hunt in the early resident season and about one-quarter hunt in the late resident season.

### **Season Structure and Preference**

Connecticut River Zone hunters are more likely to prefer the opening day of duck hunting season to be on the first weekend of October while Lake Champlain and Interior Vermont Zone hunters are divided between the first and second weekends of October. Respondents in all zones prefer the opening day of Canada goose season to be on the second weekend of October while roughly one-third have no preference for the opening day. Nearly half of respondents would prefer the opening of duck hunting season in different zones to be on the same day while only about one-quarter want them to open on different days. Majorities of Interior Vermont and Connecticut River Zone hunters prefer there to be the most duck hunting days to be in October while Lake Champlain Zone hunters are more divided. Nearly half of Lake Champlain hunters prefer a split duck season while majorities of Interior Vermont and Connecticut River Zone hunters prefer a straight duck season. About half of Interior Vermont and Connecticut River Zone hunters prefer a straight Canada goose season while a smaller plurality of Lake Champlain zone hunters feel this way. If duck season were to be split, nearly half of respondents say they would prefer the end date of the season to be in the end of December. Just over half of Lake Champlain Zone hunters say that fishing tournaments being held during duck season on Lake Champlain is not a conflict while very few say it is so much of a conflict that they won't hunt. Majorities of respondents find out about changes to the waterfowl hunting regulations from the waterfowl syllabus and fish and wildlife agency websites while one-third find out through family, friends, and hunting partners.

#### **Hunter Accessibility and Satisfaction**

Just over half most often hunt waterfowl on public state land or water while about one-third hunt waterfowl on private land owned by someone who gave permission. About half of respondents say that there are hunters around but it is not enough to make their experience worse while hunting on public lands while one-quarter say the number of hunters around them makes their experience start to decline. Three in four hunt from stationary blinds on public waters at least rarely but only one-quarter build a stationary blind on public waters most years or every year. Lake Champlain Zone hunters are most likely to describe their primary hunting habitat as a large lake or a marsh, Connecticut River zone hunters are most likely to describe their habitat as a river or stream, and Interior Vermont hunters are largely divided on how they would describe their primary hunting habitat.


## **Hunter Accessibility and Satisfaction (Continued)**

Nearly all respondents say that the mallard is one of the top three duck species that they prefer to target while four in five say the wood duck is one of their top three preferred duck species. Half say the black duck is one of their top preferred duck species while two in five say the same about the green-winged teal. Very few respondents say the common goldeneye, ring-necked duck, and greater and lesser scaup are among their top three preferred species. When asked why respondents don't get to waterfowl hunt as much as they would like, two-thirds mention not enough free time while about one-quarter cite conflicts with other hunting seasons or there not being enough waterfowl. Majorities of respondents cite getting out with family and friends, getting out in nature, and obtaining meat as their top three reasons that they participate in waterfowl hunting. More than four in five respondents say that greater accessibility to hunting lands is very or somewhat important to their overall waterfowl hunting experience while smaller majorities say the same about different start and close dates, more youth hunting opportunities, and reduced bag limit complexity. Three in four respondents say they are very satisfied or satisfied with the overall hunting experience in the past five years. Nearly half of respondents say that they spend less than \$500 on waterfowl hunting in a typical year. About one-third of respondents say they travel outside of the Lake Champlain area every year while just over one-quarter say they never do this.

## **Demographics**

Respondents to this survey are relatively spread out by age group with the average age of a respondent being 42. The large majority (71%) are residents of the state of Vermont, which is in stark contrast to the previous survey in which the majority of respondents were New York residents. This is largely due to a methodological change in which those who hunted in the Northeastern NY zone only did qualify for the 2015 survey but not the 2024 survey. More explanation of this change can be found in the technical report. More than nine in ten respondents (93%) to the survey are men and just over half of respondents (54%) do not have a four-year college degree. Just over half of respondents (55%) have a household income of \$100,000 or more. Just over a quarter of respondents (28%) are relatively new to hunting waterfowl as they have only done so for 5 years or less, while one-third (33%) have been hunting waterfowl for more than 20 years.

Figure 1: Demographics




## Waterfowl Hunting Effort and Harvest

Eighty-three percent of respondents say that they have hunted waterfowl in the state of Vermont in the past five hunting seasons while 36% of respondents have hunted waterfowl in the state of New York in the past five hunting seasons.

Among respondents who live in New York (N=170), all (100%) say they have hunted waterfowl in New York in the past five hunting seasons while 17% say they have hunted in Vermont. Among respondents who live in Vermont (N=575), all (100%) say they have hunted waterfowl in Vermont in the past five hunting seasons while 20% say they have hunted in New York. Among respondents who live in a different state (N=62), all (100%) say they have hunted waterfowl in Vermont in the past five hunting seasons while 11% say they have hunted in New York.


Figure 2: Hunt waterfowl (ducks or geese) in New York or Vermont at any time during the past five hunting seasons - By State of Residence



Nearly three-quarters of respondents (74%) say that they have hunted waterfowl in the Lake Champlain Zone in the last five years, about half (52%) have hunted waterfowl in the Interior Vermont Zone, 25% have hunted in the Northeastern NY Zone, and 13% have hunted in the Connecticut River Zone.



Figure 3a: What zone(s) have you hunted waterfowl in during the last 5 years? - (Select all that apply)




- Respondents who live in New York and those who have been hunting between 21 and 30 years are more likely than
  others to say they have hunted waterfowl in the Lake Champlain Zone in the last 5 years. Respondents who hunt in the
  Connecticut River and Interior Vermont zones, those who live outside of Vermont or New York and those who primarily
  hunt geese are less likely to say they have hunted there in last 5 years.
- Respondents who live in Vermont are more likely than others to say they have hunted waterfowl in the Interior Vermont Zone in the last 5 years while those who live in New York, those who hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone, and those who are 56 or older are less likely to say they have hunted there in last 5 years.

Among respondents who hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone (N=589), respondents spend an average of 8.8 days and a median of 5 days hunting in that zone each year. Among respondents who hunt in the Interior Vermont Zone (N=413), respondents spend an average of 8.5 days and a median of 5 days hunting in that zone each year. Among respondents who hunt in the Connecticut River Zone (N=106), respondents spend an average of 7.7 days and a median of 4 days hunting in that zone each year.


Figure 4: On average, how many days did you spend hunting in each zone each year? Mean Median



More than three in five respondents (62%) say that they hunt waterfowl every year, 23% say they hunt waterfowl most years, 10% hunt them occasional years, and 5% hunt them rarely.


In the 2015 survey, 78% of respondents said they hunt waterfowl every year, 14% did so most years, 5% did so in occasional years, and 3% did so rarely.

Figure 5a: Which of the following best describes how often you hunt waterfowl?




There are no significant differences in frequency in which respondents hunt waterfowl based upon what zone they hunt in.

Respondents aged 25 or younger and those who live in New York are more likely than others to say they hunt waterfowl every year. Respondents who primarily hunt geese, women, those who have been hunting for 5 years or less, and those with a household income between \$150,000 and \$199,999 are less likely to hunt waterfowl this often.


Figure 5c: How often do you hunt waterfowl - By Selected Demographics Every year



Two in five respondents (40%) say that they primarily hunt for ducks while just 13% primarily hunt for geese. The plurality of respondents (46%) say that they hunt ducks and geese equally.


Respondents were somewhat more likely than in the 2015 survey to say they hunt ducks and geese equally.

Figure 6a: Do you hunt primarily for:





- Women are more likely than others to say that they primarily hunt for geese.


Figure 6c: Primarily hunt - By Selected Demographics



Nearly half of respondents (47%) say that they do most of their waterfowl hunting on the weekends while 13% do most of their waterfowl hunting on weekdays. Two in five respondents (40%) say they do their waterfowl hunting equally between weekdays and weekends.



Figure 7a: When do you do most of your waterfowl hunting?




There are no significant differences in when respondents do most of their waterfowl hunting based upon what zone they hunt in.

Figure 7b: When do you do most of your waterfowl hunting - By Zone Hunted In




- Respondents who are 25 years old or younger and those who have been hunting for 5 years or less are more likely than others to say they do most of their waterfowl hunting on weekends.
- Respondents who have been hunting for more than 20 years, those aged 56 or older, and those who live in New York are more likely than others to say they do their waterfowl hunting equally between weekdays and weekends.

Figure 7c: When do you do most of your waterfowl hunting - By Selected Demographics Mostly on Weekends




Just fifteen percent of respondents say that they find waterfowl bag limit regulations difficult to understand while 85% say they don't find them difficult to understand.

Figure 8: Do you find waterfowl bag limit regulations difficult to understand?




When asked about their preference regarding greater/lesser scaup bag limits, the majority of respondents (58%) say they do not hunt scaup. Among respondents who do hunt scaup (N=338), 19% prefer a bag limit of 2 for the first 20 days of the season, 16% prefer a bag limit of 1 for all 60 days of the season, 7% prefer a bag limit of 1 for first 40 days of the season, and the majority (57%) have no preference for any of these options.

- Respondents who hunt in the Connecticut River Zone are more likely than others to say they prefer a bag limit of 2 for the first 20 days of the season.
- Respondents with a household income of \$150,000 or more and those who have been hunting for 11-20 years are more likely than others to prefer a bag limit of 1 for all 60 days of the season.
- Respondents aged 36 to 45, those who have been hunting for 10 years or less, and those with a household income between \$100,000 and \$149,999 are more likely to say they have no preference.


Figure 9b: Preference regarding greater/lesser scaup bag limits - By Selected Demographics Bag limit of 2 for the first 20 days of the season



Eighty-eight percent of respondents say that in an average hunting season, they devote at least one day to Canada Geese. More than three in four respondents (78%) devote at least one day to hunting dabbling ducks while a small majority (53%) devote at least one day to diving ducks. Only one-quarter of respondents (24%) devote at least one day to snow geese while fewer dedicate at least one day to hunting mergansers (18%) or brant (7%).


These responses are largely similar to those in the 2015 survey.

Figure 10a: In an average hunting season how many days do you devote to the waterfowl listed below?




- Respondents who hunt ducks and geese equally and those who primarily hunt geese are more likely than others to say they devote at least one day in an average season to hunting Canada Geese while those who primarily hunt ducks are less likely to do this.
- Respondents who have been hunting for more than 20 years are more likely than others to say they devote at least one day in an average season to hunting dabbling ducks while those who primarily hunt geese, women, and those aged 25 or younger are less likely to do this.
- Respondents who have been hunting for more than 30 years are more likely than others to say they devote at least one
  day in an average season to hunting diving ducks while those who primarily hunt geese and women are less likely to do
  this.
- Respondents who hunt ducks and geese equally are more likely than others to say they devote at least one day in an average season to hunting snow geese while those who primarily hunt ducks are less likely to do this.

Figure 10b: In average hunting season devote at least one day to type of waterfowl - By Selected Demographics




Just over half of respondents (56%) say that they typically hunt in the early resident Canada goose season in September, 71% typically hunt in the regular migratory season in October and November, and 27% typically hunt in the late resident season in December and January. Eleven percent do not hunt in any of the above Canada goose seasons.

- Respondents who primarily hunt geese or hunt ducks or geese equally, those with a household income less than \$50,000, those aged 25 or younger, and those who hunt in the Connecticut River Zone are more likely than others to say they typically hunt in the early resident Canada goose season. Respondents who live in a state other than New York or Vermont, those who primarily hunt ducks, those who have been hunting for 21 to 30 years, and those with a household income between \$150,000 and \$199,999 are less likely to hunt in this season.
- Respondents who hunt ducks and geese equally are more likely than others to say they typically hunt in the regular migratory season while those who primarily hunt ducks are less likely to say this.
- Respondents who hunt ducks and geese equally are more likely than others to say they typically hunt in the late resident season while those who primarily hunt ducks and those who live in a state other than New York or Vermont are less likely to say this.


Figure 11b: Which of the <u>Canada goose</u> seasons do you typically hunt in - By Selected Demographics Early resident (September)

## Season Structure and Preference

Twenty-eight percent of respondents say they would prefer the opening day of duck hunting season to be in the first weekend of October for the Lake Champlain Zone, a similar amount (25%) would prefer the second weekend of October, very few would prefer the third (7%) or fourth (4%) weekend of October, and 37% have no preference. One-quarter of respondents (26%) say they would prefer the opening day of duck hunting season to be in the first weekend of October for the Interior Vermont Zone, one in five (20%) would prefer the second weekend of October, very few would prefer the third (4%) or fourth (1%) weekend of October, and nearly half (48%) have no preference. Fifteen percent of respondents say they would prefer the opening day of duck hunting season in the Connecticut River Zone to be the first weekend of October, very few would prefer the second (5%), third (2%), or fourth (1%) weekend of October, and the large majority (78%) have no preference.

Among respondents who hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone (N=596), 32% prefer the opening day to be on the first weekend, 31% prefer the second weekend, and 24% have no preference. Among respondents who hunt in the Interior Vermont Zone (N=413), 37% prefer the opening day to be on the first weekend, 29% prefer the second weekend, and 26% have no preference. Among respondents who hunt in the Connecticut River Zone (N=106), the majority (56%) prefer the opening day to be on the first weekend while 27% have no preference.





Figure 12b: Prefer opening day of duck hunting season - By Zone Hunted In

Among respondents who hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone, those with a household income between \$50,000 and \$74,999 are more likely to prefer the opening day of duck hunting season in the Lake Champlain Zone to be the second weekend of October. Respondents who primarily hunt geese and those who completed postgraduate work are less likely to prefer this.



Respondents who have completed postgraduate work and those with a household income between \$150,000 and \$199,999 are less likely to prefer this.
- Among respondents who hunt in the Interior Vermont Zone, those who have hunted for 21 to 30 years and those who
  live in a state other than New York or Vermont are more likely than others to prefer the opening day of duck hunting
  season in the Interior Vermont Zone to be the second weekend of October. Women and those who have been hunting
  for 5 years or less are less likely to prefer this.




Figure 12e: Prefer opening day of  $\underline{duck}$  hunting season in Connecticut River Zone among Connecticut River Zone Hunters - By Selected Demographics

First Weekend of October




Forty-five percent of respondents say they would prefer the opening day of Canada goose hunting season in the Lake Champlain Zone to be on the second weekend of October, very few would prefer the third (6%) or fourth (4%) weekend of October, and 46% have no preference. Two in five respondents (40%) say they would prefer the opening day of Canada goose hunting season in the Interior Vermont Zone to be on the second weekend of October, very few would prefer the third (5%) or fourth (2%) weekend of October, and more than half (53%) have no preference. Seventeen percent of respondents say they would prefer the opening day of Canada goose season in the Connecticut River Zone to be on the second weekend of October, very few prefer the third (3%) or fourth (1%) weekend of October, and the large majority (79%) have no preference.

Among respondents who hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone (N=587), 53% prefer the opening day to be on the second weekend and 36% have no preference. Among respondents who hunt in the Interior Vermont Zone (N=412), 55% prefer the opening day to be on the second weekend and 35% have no preference. Among respondents who hunt in the Connecticut River Zone (N=103), the majority (53%) prefer the opening day to be on the second weekend while 34% have no preference.


Figure 13b: Prefer opening day of Canada goose hunting season - By Zone Hunted In



Among respondents who hunt in the Interior Vermont Zone, women are more likely than others to prefer the opening day of Canada goose hunting season in the Interior Vermont Zone to be on the second weekend of October. Those between the ages of 46 and 55, those who have completed postgraduate work, and those who primarily hunt ducks are less likely to prefer this.




Figure 13d: Prefer opening day of <u>Canada goose</u> hunting season in Connecticut River Zone among Connecticut River Zone Hunters - By Selected Demographics

Second Weekend of October





Figure 14a: Would you prefer the opening of duck hunting season in different zones to be on the same day or on different days?





Thirty-six percent of respondents say they would prefer to have the most duck hunting days open in October in the Lake Champlain Zone, 24% would prefer the most hunting days in November, 15% would prefer December, and 26% have no preference. Thirty-nine percent of respondents say they would prefer to have the most duck hunting days open in October in the Interior Vermont Zone, 15% would prefer the most hunting days in November, 6% would prefer December, and 40% have no preference. Nineteen percent of respondents say they would prefer to have the most duck hunting days open in October in the Connecticut River Zone, 6% would prefer the most hunting days in November, 3% would prefer December, and the majority (72%) have no preference.

Among respondents who hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone (N=590), 38% prefer the most hunting days to be in October, 29% prefer the most days in November, 18% prefer December, and 15% have no preference. Among respondents who hunt in the Interior Vermont Zone (N=417), just over half (53%) prefer the most hunting days to be in October, 21% prefer the most days in November, 8% prefer December, and 18% have no preference. Among respondents who hunt in the Connecticut River Zone (N=106), just over half (54%) prefer the most hunting days to be in October, 17% prefer the most days in November, 11% prefer December, and 18% have no preference.





Figure 15b: Preferred month to have the most duck hunting days open - By Zone Hunted In


Figure 15c: Preferred month to have the <u>most duck hunting days open</u> in Lake Champlain Zone among Lake Champlain Zone Hunters - By Selected Demographics




Figure 15e: Preferred month to have the <u>most duck hunting days open</u> in Connecticut River Zone among Connecticut River Zone Hunters - By Selected Demographics


Figure 16a: Do you prefer a straight or split duck season in the following zones?


Figure 16b: Prefer a straight or split duck season - By Zone Hunted In




Figure 16d: Prefer a <u>straight</u> or <u>split</u> duck season in Interior Vermont Zone among Interior Vermont Zone Hunters - By Selected Demographics


Figure 17a: Prefer a straight or split Canada goose season in the following zones?


Figure 17b: Prefer a straight or split Canada goose season - By Zone Hunted In






Figure 17e: Prefer a <u>straight</u> or <u>split</u> Canada goose season in Interior Connecticut River Zone among Connecticut River Zone Hunters - By Selected Demographics




Figure 18b: If the duck season is split, preference for the end date of the season - By Zone Hunted In



Among respondents who hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone (N=582), just over half (54%) of respondents say that it is not a conflict when fishing tournaments are held during duck season on Lake Champlain. Two in five (39%) believe that fishing tournaments on Lake Champlain during duck season is somewhat of a conflict while 7% say it is so much of a conflict that they won't hunt.

Respondents are slightly more likely to say that this is not a conflict (54%) than in the 2015 survey (48%) and are slightly less likely to say that it is so much of a conflict that they won't hunt (7%) compared to 2015 (13%).


Figure 19b: How much of conflict when fishing tournaments are held during duck season on Lake Champlain - By Selected Demographics





## **Hunter Accessibility and Satisfaction**

Just over half of respondents (54%) say they most often hunt for waterfowl on public state land or water while nearly one-third (31%) say they hunt for waterfowl most often on private land owned by someone who gave permission. Very few respondents most often hunt waterfowl on public federal land or water (8%), private land they own (5%), or private land under lease (1%).

Figure 21a: Which type of land do you hunt most often for waterfowl?



Figure 21b: Type of land you hunt <u>most often</u> for waterfowl - By Selected Demographics Public State land/water





When asked how best to describe the amount of other people hunting waterfowl on the same lands, half of respondents (50%) say that some hunters are around but not enough to make their experience worse while just over one-quarter (27%) say there are enough hunters around that their experience starts to decline. Seven percent say there are not enough hunters around them, 4% say there are so many hunters that their experience is barely worth making the trip, 2% say there are so many hunters that they will leave or not come back, and 11% say they do not hunt on public lands.



Figure 22: When hunting waterfowl on public lands, how would you best describe, on average, the amount of other people hunting waterfowl on the same lands?





Figure 23: How often do you hunt from stationary blinds on public waters or waterways?





Figure 24: How often do you build a stationary blind on public waters or waterways?





Figure 25a: What would you consider to be the primary habitat that you hunt in the following zones?





Figure 25b: Primary habitat that you hunt in the Lake Champlain Zone - By Selected Demographics





Figure 25c: Primary habitat that you hunt in the Interior Vermont Zone - By Selected Demographics Field





Figure 26b: Top three overall preferred duck species to target - By Selected Demographics Black Duck






More than two-thirds of respondents (68%) say that one of the reasons they don't get to hunt waterfowl as much as they would like is not having a enough free time while roughly one-quarter cite conflicts with other hunting seasons (27%) and there not being enough waterfowl (22%). Less than one in five respondent cite access to private lands (18%), access to public lands (12%), weather (11%), financial cost (6%), or regulations being too complex (4%). Six percent of respondents cite another reason and 5% say the question is not applicable because they are able to hunt waterfowl as much as they would like.

Figure 27a: If you do not get to waterfowl hunt as much as you would like, what are the reasons? (Select all that apply)





Figure 27b: Reasons do not get to waterfowl hunt as much as you would like - By Selected Demographics Not enough free time (family/work commitments, etc.)




Four in five respondents (80%) say that getting out with family and friends is the most important (51%), second most important (18%), or third most important (11%) reason that they participate in waterfowl hunting. Figure 28a: Top three reasons that you participate in waterfowl hunting





Figure 28b: Top three reasons that you participate in waterfowl hunting - By Selected Demographics Getting out in nature




More than four in five respondents (84%) say that greater accessibility to hunting lands is very (58%) or somewhat important (26%) to their overall waterfowl hunting experience. More than two-thirds of respondents (69%) say that different start and close dates is very or somewhat important while smaller majorities say the same about more youth hunting opportunities (63%) or reduced bag limit complexity (56%). 
Figure 29b: Very or somewhat important to waterfowl hunting experience - By Selected Demographics Different start and close dates



Figure 30a: How satisfied have you been with your waterfowl hunting experience in the past 5 years?





Figure 30b: Satisfaction with waterfowl hunting experience in the past 5 years - By Selected Demographics Very Satisfied & Satisfied





Figure 31a: How much money do you spend on waterfowl hunting in a typical year? (including trips, boats, blind equipment, decoys, etc.)






Figure 32b: How often do you travel outside of the Lake Champlain area to hunt waterfowl - By Selected Demographics

# **Technical Report**

The 2024 Vermont & New York Waterfowl Hunters survey was a survey of a stratified sample of waterfowl hunters in Vermont and New York. In order to ensure that the data captured responses of hunters across demographic groups, particularly gender and age, the sample was put into the following strata:

- 1) Women or other gender
- 2) Men, Under 18 years of age
- 3) Men, ages 18-25
- 4) Men, ages 26-35
- 5) Men, ages 36-45
- 6) Men, ages 46-55
- 7) Men, ages 56+

Six thousand (6,000) respondents were initially drawn to be invited to participate in this survey, with 3,000 coming from each state. While ideally the sample would have been divided equally by each stratum in both states, in cases where there weren't enough potential respondents in a particular stratum, all respondents would be included. The number of respondents from the remaining strata would be proportionally increased in order to reach the 6,000 respondents needed.

## Qualification to Participate in the Survey

In order to participate in the survey, respondents had to have hunted waterfowl in the state of New York or Vermont in the past 5 years and have hunted in one of the following zones:

- -Lake Champlain Zone
- -Interior Vermont Zone
- -Connecticut River Zone

Unlike the previous survey conducted in 2015, respondents who hunted only in the Northeastern NY Zone did not qualify to participate in the survey. Because of this, far fewer New York respondents qualified for this survey. In order to try to increase the number of qualified New York residents to complete the survey, the remaining five hundred and eighty-one (581) hunters who were not selected for the survey but lived in the counties close to Lake Champlain (Clinton, Essex, Franklin, Washington, and Warren) were added to the sample.

#### When Data Was Collected

Data collection utilized a 4 step approach:

- 1) Letters with a link and QR code were sent to the entire sample
- 2) Emails with a survey link were sent to non-responders with an email address on file
- 3) A text reminder was sent to non-responders with a cell phone number on file
- 4) Phone calls were made to non-responders who had a land line or cell phone number on file

Data was collected between August 15th and October 8th and one thousand, four hundred and thirty-two (1,432) hunters took the survey with eight hundred and seven (807) being qualified to complete the entire survey. The number of responses and qualified completes by mode can be found below:

## **Response Rate**

While 1,432 respondents participated in the survey, resulting in a response rate of 22%, many respondents, particularly New York hunters, did not qualify for the survey because they did not hunt in any of three hunting zones of interest. 807 respondents qualified and completed survey, resulting in a qualified completion rate (# of Qualified Completes/(Sample - Not Qualified Completes)) of 14%. The response rate to the survey is largely consistent across strata, with those in stratum 2 less likely to respond while those in stratum 7 were slightly more likely to respond. Response rate by strata and by state can be found below:

- A lot of hunters (including guides) that need education regarding ethics
- A really low bag limit on ducks like scalp means there must be a declining or low population. Better off not hunting at all rather than have a 1 or 2 bird limit.
- A suggestion I have would be to have a larger bag limit for late season goose. As opposed of going from early season where you can shoot upwards of 15 per person to late season where you can only shoot 2 per person. Bag limit should be closer to 5 per person at least during the late season. Thank you
- Access to resident geese is near impossible as they spend most of their time in areas like the Region 1 NYDEC headquarters front lawn.
- Adding more reporting stations would be helpful
- All information and regulations or events should have multiple points of contact/ways people can find out about it and get involved the community/get involved without necessarily hunting.
- Allow bag limits In each state
- Always liked it when every other year opening day was on Wednesday.
- At my age and experience with waterfowl hunting, I find that bagging a duck or two is no longer very important. I just love being in cattails before daybreak, listening and watching, and hearing waterfowl wings overhead. If a few ducks decoy, I'm delighted. If not, I always see and hear something of interest in the marsh. I duck hunt now because I still feel that stir in my heart when the weather turns cold and the leaves turn gold. I feel fortunate that I have a camp on Lake Champlain and can paddle my canoe a few hundred yards to a cattail point. I hunt alone now as I'm some distance from old duck hunting buddies and the grown kids who used to go when young.
- Birds don't migrate as much due to weather. hit or miss.

- Canada goose bag limits are way too low. Why go out and set up all the decoys then have to pick up everything after only a couple of geese are down partially since Canadas are a nuisance everywhere and in increasing numbers
- Change Interior Vermont to close when Lake Champlain closes.
- Change the policies along the Champlain valley so farmers don't have to trim land so early. There is not as much feed for the migrating birds. Regulations are different in NY.
- Currently in Vermont hunters do not need permission to hunt on private land unless the
  property is posted. I believe people hunting on private land should be responsible for
  obtaining written permission from the land owners regardless if the property's posted
  status.
- Dear researchers thank you for doing this survey it really helps us hunters. The one thing I would like to add is while hunting ducks it is hard to tell the difference between black ducks and female mallards from shooting range. Especially for new hunters so maybe making black ducks count toward your mallard bag limit and increase said bag limit instead of being two sperate limits. Thanks again.
- Do I get a free hat?
- Don't make it hard pertaining to seasons, concrete days.
- Duck and geese need 3 things food, habitat and a place to rest, Vermont has lost most it's
  food due to farming practices so the fly ways move west where the food is. With no real food
  and the large population of geese are we starving the puddle ducks out. With hunter
  numbers dropping we are in big trouble. We may soon be regulated by the legislature like
  they're trying to do to the bear and coyote hunters. Then these beautiful birds will have no
  support at all.
- Duck flights or numbers seem to have changed. 5 years ago we had great hunting in the corn. Only hunt geese in the corn until youth rifle season. Grew up on Champlain, had some great hunts.
- Duck species of Mallard and Black need support. Weather patterns seem to be driving migrations further east toward the coastal regions vs Lake Champlain corridor. Public lands areas with too many hunters crowding and actively competing for spots I just don't go or go on "off days". Need more enforcement of separation distances in hot spot places like Goose Bay in Swanton/Alburg/Highgate. Those jerks are going to hurt somebody. Split seasons make absolutely NO SENSE at all from the field. Geese I harvest opportunistically while hunting ducks but definitely overpopulated and need larger limits to make hunting more effective at population control. Snow geese barely come to VT anymore.. vast majority in this zone gone west to NY because of available waste grains over there. VT Agricultural practices spoil the food availability in VT just as the snows are coming through.
- Every property is owned by the big farms so no hunting fields unless you work for them. And the seasons seem to not be aligned with the times the birds are here. And one year we had a limit of one goose up here in NY but down south in NY the limit was a lot higher than the northern zone.
- Farm runoff ruining waterfowl habitat.... far more money and effort by state to perpetuate habitat and breeding opportunities...encroachment of solar fields and other infrastructure too close to designated wildlife areas

- Farms are getting fewer and bigger. Outfitters have leased most of the large farms in my area. Those few that are not leased have so many hunters asking permission the answer is usually "no".
- Fish and game websites could be more clear on season dates, especially the Vermont one. It gets confusing, you have to dig to find the most accurate information
- For New York and Vermont, they didn't have the split season for the past couple of years, they should have the split season and push back the start date and have the end date be in January because of the winters.
- Global warming and warmer fall temperatures are certainly impacting the migration... Also, here in Vermont it seems that we have numerous Wildlife Management Areas - But limited to No access to said sites...???
- Happy about expanding geese to 2 packs
- Having duck hunted Lake Champlain for almost 25 years, there is a noticeable shift in duck numbers from the beginning till the end of the season. It seems like birds are migrating later and later each year. I used to hunt from start to finish, now I tend to start hunting in November and really put time in during December. You may want to consider even pushing the season into January of the next year as there is no doubt still birds around, especially divers. Regardless I enjoy how the season at least now goes to the end of December instead of the beginning/middle. Thanks!

- Interesting survey, I would be curious to see how many hunters use a dog for waterfowl.
- I actually hunt primarily in the interior zone but was unable to go back to that question in the survey. Please correct this.
- I always think it's good that researchers are doing stuff to figure out what's going on in the waterfowl community, they have many varied opinions. It's great that universities have as much contact as they can with hunters
- I appreciate it and thank you for what you are doing.
- I believe that trying to fit in the waterfowl and rifle season without encroaching on the other season is difficult.
- I don't hunt in VT too frequently. I hit primarily near my home in NH, but each year I seem to spend more time in VT.
- I don't like when it starts on a Wednesday, I'd rather the season start on Saturday
- I feel strongly that there needs to be more regulation of non-consumptive users and antihunters and protection for LAW ABIDING participants. The harassment of the above listed individuals is truly brutal! It is hard to pass on the importance of the resource and hunting as a conservation tool when you also have to contend with the previously mentioned people/ groups. I feel that too many of our regulations are being tainted by these groups and the focus is on politics and not science.
- I find years that bag limits are 1 goose or 2 mallards it's not worth setting up to hunt. I fully understand if the population doesn't support the numbers but I would like to understand the reasons for changing year to year bag limits.
- I find your split zones useless and your seasons on both ducks and geese too short! Limited access areas hard to reach. For both hunting waterfowl and big game I find it more cheaper

- and more rewarding to hunt were the game is, I will spend my money in states and countries that that provide a more enriching experience
- I heard through the grapevine, is it true that NY state will open with a new teal season only? it would be nice to have an early September teal season
- I know it's important to have youth and military hunting but opening the season for them prior to the main opening day has ruined hunting as far as I'm concerned. The ducks are already shot at, very skittish and the opening days have declined tremendously since these youth weekends have started. Maybe this is intentional to have birds shot less I don't know, but it has significantly reduced the enjoyment of hunting on opening day. I used to limit out every single opening day, in the last decade and probably limited out just a few days. Much less birds and much more skittish and won't decoy. Just my two cents.
- I know split season is very important for some people to have a later closing date. Conflict with guys fishing down south end can be a big deal.
- I never grew up hunting and did not grow up in New England... So, finding place to hunt is a huge challenge. And, when land/opportunities are available, it seems like the season here is stacked towards periods of times where bird traffic is minimal. It definitely seems like (whether due to climate change or what) the vast majority of birds are not arriving/transiting the area until later and later in the season. The best days I've had have come right around the Christmas holiday, and last year I watched concentration of birds filling the areas I hunt well after the season had closed.
- I only hunt the Ct. River zone as that is where I live. I prefer the late season as there are more birds, less hunting pressure and the weather is colder. I put much less effort into it now, but love being out along the river with my lab. I do think the limits are too restrictive for the average hunter who may or not be able to easily ID species. Fortunately, it is not a problem for me.
- I only spend one week per year in Vermont hunting grouse and waterfowl. I'm a Maryland resident.
- I prefer a Wednesday opener least every other year, and the later end date on Champlain zone the better the hunting typically is so prefer late December close
- I primarily hunt Lake Champlain late season, I would like that season to go as late in December as possible.
- I think more needs to be done about the Cormorant problem. Back in the 1980's there were only a few spotted. Now we watch hundreds land at a time on more than just one occasion. Other than that, the Lake Champlain basin has seen great improvement. Bald Eagle and Loon sightings are a daily experience, and evidence of a healthy ecosystem. There has been great success with the Lamprey program also. Perhaps the same type of energy and resources could be used to bring the Cormorant numbers down to zero again.
- I think that the interior and lake Champlain zone should be split by rte 7 and not 22a. Perhaps seasons should all be the same or not separated into zones. I was pleased to see interior zone was open later this year. With ice conditions not forming until later in the season birds seem to use the open interior zone with better food resources and the lake is dead. I would love to see more public hunting lands and breeding habitat conservation on Champlain and its tributaries. With all the storm events bottomlands are getting less

expensive and it would be great to see more public field or restored floodplain hunting opportunities. Shorelines are becoming more and more scarce and land owners less friendly to hunters especially ones up at 5am blasting. I would prefer seeing more bird diversity and killing more mallards (glad to see it's back to 4).

- I think that tradition and dog training is especially important when considering why people hunt.
- I think the bag limit during earlier season of ducks could be higher I know some states allow 8 ducks, we would be okay with that number in the northeast and Lake Champlain zones... that goes off from population numbers as well if its a low year obviously not... if its a high or avg year then yeah...
- I think with the climate getting warmer, the ducks don't move in until later in the season/after the season is over, especially with diver ducks. Maybe a late diver duck season closing in late December-mid January would provide more opportunity to diver duck hunting on Lake Champlain.
- I was expecting a question regarding what day of the week waterfowl season begins..

  Historically the first day has rotated between Wed and Sat openings. My preference on this would be an opening day of Wednesday. Thanks for including me in your survey, I hope my answers are helpful!
- I would like separate duck hunting seasons from deer hunting season I don't want to miss one them
- I would like to keep the split season open later in the year, we typically target diving ducks which depending on the weather changes do not start heavy migrations until late in the season. If there was a way to split seasons for goldeneye and scaup to allow hunting into mid January that would be ideal based on the numbers we have seen late season in recent years
- I would like to see a mentoring program for hunters taking up new sports, or members newly receiving their Hunter Safety certification. Someone local to discuss the ins & outs, including how bag limits work, to advise on locations and decoys, etc..
- I would like to see an early teal season for a chance to get blue wing teal
- I would like to see the blue bill, why we can only shoot one when there are thousands every year.
- I would love to see a September wood duck only season. I see a ton of wood ducks in September during the early goose season but numbers start go down by the time the season opens in October.
- I would prefer that the southern NY zone to have 2 different veteran days and the interior NY zone have 2 different veteran days.
- I would suggest an education flyer to identify ducks that a hunter can plan on seeing. I believe this will help some understand the waterfowl abstracts. Also I would lower the daily limit to 3 ducks total. Moreover not splitting the season impacts the diver duck season. They don't arrive until late November and it's helpful to those who already bagged a deer. They can still get out and hunt later in December. Also the snow goose population is almost nonexistent in the lake Champlain zone.
- I'm a first-generation waterfowl hunter. I got into it because friends recruited me and because of YouTube channels like MeatEater. I'm 30 now but wish I got into waterfowl

hunting earlier. Youth programs are very important for new hunter recruitment. I wish there was more continuing ed available for "moderate" experience level hunters. I went to a Waterfowl Hunters Ed/Waterfowl ID course so I can get onto National Refugees and was amazed at how far people traveled to take the class. There just weren't many available post-COVID.

- I'd like to see more youth out hunting, like I said in survey it's very hard to find land where I'm from when a big farm don't allow people to hunt it's sad lotta great land an great memories to be made there.. not many can afford this type of hunting with equipment an travel that's why I hunt close to home ... Thanks for your support
- I'm a Rutland Co resident, I hunt interior VT zone, usually the last 3 weekends of the season are by far the best 3 weeks of the season, I've seen as much as 300+ ducks in huge flocks, mass amounts of geese as well, I've learned the wood ducks are the first to leave and the mallards/black ducks push hard with a heavy cold front, I hope to see VT fish and game extend the season into early January, keep the goose bag limits high and maybe even up the mallard bag limit to 6 for the month of December till the end, limiting out on mallards in December comes sometimes before 9am. I love all the work you guys do thank you!
- I'm curious of the results of this survey, hopefully there's enough willing participants, but would like to receive a notice when I'll be able to read a published conclusion or paper to my email
- I'm more likely to take a survey over the phone when I can talk to someone rather than push buttons
- Increase the bag limit amount for geese in the late season the second season...
- Is anyone looking into why lake Champlain has more Scaup than ever in the last 10 years? and are the breading areas changing? I see more diving ducks breading in the Lake Champlain zone where that was something you never would see 10 years ago? I have hunted and fished my entire life and see 10s of 1000s of Scaup now where you would only see a few 100 in the past, but yet the survey numbers are declining.. Thanks
- It would be nice if both the VT and NY portions of Lake Champlain were combined so you could hunt the entire lake without having to buy a license for each side of the lake, with the same bag limits. The early season Goose hunt should be eliminated. With the massive amounts of Bluebills, we see on the lake the bag limits need to be substantially increased to justify the expense and time needed to make hunting them worthwhile. Typically, the hunting on Lake Champlain gets better towards the end of the season. No one likes to hunt waterfowl when it's 70 + degrees! Eliminate afternoon/evening hunting. This will give the birds a chance to rest and stay around longer.
- It would be very helpful to have the agencies provide maps/literature of access areas and places where waterfowl hunting is legal. Federal, State, other... Finding places to hunt to make sure you are following all the rules and regulations is the most challenging part and creates a barrier to entry. I would love to get out and hunt more, but it's very difficult to understand the places that will allow it.
- It's not necessarily access to Lake Champlain, the issue I ran into over the last 10 years was a bunch of small farms where farmers would let you hunt, all those small families sold out to bigger farms. Even if you go to those bigger farms with an insurance policy they don't let anyone hunt their fields. I had an enclosed trailer with a whole spread and got out of field

hunting one time because there was nowhere to go. In more recent time there has been more pressure on public waters but I'm pretty sure it's just because guys can't get into fields. It's impossible to hunt

- Just not the ducks there used to be, used to tag out in a couple hours and be selective on what you shot.
- Just try for public land access, and bag limit is already very small compared to other states, so there will be a decreased interest in duck hunting if the bag limit stays where it is and does not increase.
- Keep seasons as late as possible, migration is happening later and later every year.
- keep surveying people who actually spend time outside, keep decision making to the sports men
- Keep up the data collection it's important.
- Keep up the great work on thoughtful regulations, enforcement, habitat improvements, land acquisition and hunter recruitment! I pay my Vermont fees with a smile on my face. The federal stamp price is way too high it is driving down the number and more importantly the diversity of waterfowl hunters. Please let the Feds know they are killing the activity, especially among younger hunters, new and diverse groups of hunters and hunters with lower incomes. This cannot be an activity exclusively for well-off white men who have hunted waterfowl their entire lives and that is the effect of the high federal stamp price.
- Last two questions should be taken off, focus on habitats and cleaning trash.
- Last year was my first year hunting waterfowl and I only targeted Canada goose. I didn't have any of my own equipment specific for waterfowl, so I was limited to going with friends who had extra equipment that I could borrow.
- Lifetime deer hunter, new to waterfowl in these past 3 years. Hope this was helpful!
- Limit line in syllabus
- Looking into a September duck season
- Me personally I would like to see a bigger daily bag limit for Canada goose during the migratory season in the interior zone. I don't travel much, I have kids, kinda busy so hunting closer to home is important and honestly sometimes I find myself going why do all the work to scout and set up for 3 geese? that honestly has kept me home on a few occasions. If it was upped to 8 or 10 I think I would go more. Don't get me wrong getting out to go hunting is something I enjoy and wouldn't trade it for anything other than trading a goose hunting day to go sit in my tree stand with my bow for a deer, way less set up isn't a big deal if I don't shoot anything
- More goose limit in the mid-season. Open duck hunting up earlier
- More Public access and seasons should be open when ducks and geese are most plentiful.
- My best weeks hunting last year were middle of November and beginning of December
- My big concern for the Connecticut river zone is freezing or lack of. It can always mess up a
  season as the river and skinny water can freeze out birds. I also feel like I've seen a decline
  in migrating birds. They may have left for greener pastures. Literally. We need less mature
  forest and more large fields and agriculture. Vermont has been hugging trees that provide
  little resources.
- New duck hunter just learning how to go on my own. Answers may change over time!

- New York is better. I went a few years ago and got some fully body decoys, it was unbelievable with the amount of birds! They hardly see the same kind of geese over there than what we usually see.
- New York State Canada Goose regulation / populations are micro managed to the detriment of hunters and possibly geese. When I have attempted to provide feedback to NYSDEC waterfowl managers met with a placating "we know best" attitude. The favorite response from them is "this is what our desk data shows us", which tells me they are not out in the field. Vermont Department of Wildlife expressed interest in what hunters concerns are at annual meeting and provided very good data to support their positions. They will actually call you back. Keep up the good work. NYS is well NYS.....
- No straight seasons in the Lake Champlain Zone
- Not an avid waterfowl hunter just a good reason to walk in the woods if I see them it's a bonus
- One issue with accessing land to hunt is understanding conservation easements some allow hunting and some don't and information about whether or not they do is tough to come by. Because of this, we stay generally on public land instead of easements, but if hunting is permitted at these sites, more information saying so would be beneficial.
- Open up even sooner, run in September for ducks, ending beginning of December.
- Opening day of the season sometimes coincides with deer hunting which is a real bad conflict because you have to decide if you're gonna duck hunt or deer hunt. The opening days should be before deer season starts
- Opening day should be in the middle of the week like it used to be. Then every 5 years open
  it on a Saturday. This elevates opening day hunting pressure. Also we need to open the
  season early and end it late. We miss the start of the Teal migration and even some of the
  wood ducks. Vermont also needs a dove season
- Our season are not aligning with the weather conditions, it seems to stay warmer in later months and we rarely get to see migrating ducks in November and December.
- Our state is regulated by Vt. Although according to agreement I helped participate in the 70's, we on the N.Y. state side of the pond get little or no say in season setting dates! Oh yeah, they hold meetings over here and give us opportunity to speak and then just do what they think Vt. wants. They supposedly work with our region 5 who just lays back and endorses what Vt. biologists state for seasons! Example: we have asked that our LC season open early October so we too can harvest blue wing teal (that southern states have early seasons for) and also our most prevalent bag duck, woodie, and they refuse to do so stating Vermonters want to shoot geese opening duck season and framework won't let them till 2nd weekend in Oct. This after they have hunted geese prattle the whole month of Sept. already!! This up of taxation (NY State land taxes and hunting fees) without "proper" representation needs to be addressed by our State representatives!
- Overall, I think both Vt. and NY. do a good job managing the Champlain zone.
- Please devote more resources to habitant improvement projects, including designated parking, trails, boat launching, acceptable areas for construction of blinds, firearms safety, etc.
- Please don't change the Lake Champlain zone and interior zones boundaries. I know this
  has been brought up in past waterfowl meetings. Moving the interior zone boundary further

west to the edge of lake Champlain would reduce opportunities to hunt field ducks later on in the year.

- Please implement a cormorant season in the Lake Champlain area. The cormorants are destroying hunting and fishing habitat.
- Please send me the results
- Public access is the largest barrier of entry for most who can invest \$\$\$\$ into a boat. The
  national wildlife refuge should be an excellent opportunity for draw hunts and or later
  season access. I would also like to see more land management projects with private
  landowners to increase waterfowl productivity.
- Raise bag limit for Lake Champlain regular season for Canadian Gease and have no spilt season- straight through
- Raise the middle goose season limit in the central VT zone to at least 5 and lower the late season to 3
- Reciprocal with NH?
- Regarding LCZ duck dates would be a good idea to have 2 splits, opening early as possible
  in October for only 3-4 days close for a week or two then open again for a week or so close
  for a bit then open again to end of December. Some years many ducks migrate out of LCZ
  before Mid October opener, also hunting is only good for a couple days at a time early
  season and time is needed to let birds rebuild
- Regulations and zones are too complex. Split seasons with interior zone ending in December usually means lost days because small waters are frozen over and the ducks move over to big waters like Lake Champlain and the Connecticut River.
- Regulations too complex.
- Seems that waterfall hunting is declining. I would hunt more often if I had a companion.
- Seen a huge decline of geese and ducks in the past 20 years, used to have a ton of snow geese in the Connecticut river zone and now there are none and something needs to be done to get this changed or fixed
- Sept goose season should end at sunset, not 1/2 after. Encourages late shooting Blows up the roost for ducks Isn't needed
- Several questions should not be made to hunters. They should be answered only by waterfowl biologists for the purpose of keeping or improving the population of waterfowl.
- Take my answers with a grain of salt. I'm a novice hunter and don't get out much. I just follow what the rules say and go by that

- The bag limit lower. The season needs to go higher.
- The diver season should end later than it does
- The duck hunting in Addison County is nothing like it used to be. I would hunt a lot more if it weren't so. It seems like the ducks are showing up later and later, the best hunting now is in December and then the season ends.
- The lack of ducks in this dly zones...what would be your explanation? Global warming or what?
- The migration has moved west. The birds aren't on the east coast like they used to. I'd like to know the main reason for that
- The number of duck hunters has been decreasing in the Lake Champlain zone. The number of ducks have also been decreasing.
- The question about how often do you travel outside of the Champlain zone is poorly worded and implies we either live or hunt primarily within that zone. I'm from the NEK and have never hunted the Champlain zone
- The results are only as good as the questions. Some of the questions are lacking
- The seasons should be staggered more because ducks seem to fly later, earlier season there's not much out there. I like to go later in the season
- The spilt season for regulating geese and ducks is troublesome because the birds have already started to fly.
- The upkeep of state boat launcher is important to me.
- There are tons of scaup on Lake Champlain especially when you can only take 1-2 depending on time of year... would like to see it be bumped up a tad more to give more shooting opportunities for people
- There needs to be an open season on Cormorant. They are destroying the land with their poop, they are depleting the fish population and are a nuisance. I'd like to ad also that most of the Canada goose flyway has seemed to have shifted to the New York side of Lake Champlain. That being said myself and other hunters feel as those the geese that we see over on the Vermont side of the lake are local birds that have access to water and food year round. So when you get a 1 goose limit it's hardly worth going out for. This years bag limit is 3 which is nice but 5 would be more practical. As far as scaup goes I don't understand why the limit is 1 and 2. They raft in groups of 100+ you would have to buy 100 decoys to even get

- a chance at shooting at them. So all that money and time would have to be invested into getting 1 or 2 birds..
- They close early season September the geese fly away by that time.
- This year the Lake Champlain opens on fifth of October and closes on the 13th and in NY it
  opens on October 12... I don't understand why both sides of the lake wouldn't be open at
  the same time
- Trend of fewer birds in this flyway has me concerned
- Vermont and NY really need to curtail the bass tournaments during waterfowl season. Not issuing permits for bass tournaments does not prevent anyone from fishing, but eliminating the competition/business side of fishing will do a lot to prevent conflicts. If I had a dollar for every time I had to unload and wait for bass boats to get out of range, or stop casting around decoys, I would be a wealthy man. I have witnessed a dramatic decrease of hunters in the Shoreham VT area where I hunt, and the commonly heard reason when I ask why someone doesn't hunt anymore is bass tournaments. These tournaments are continuous all spring, summer and fall. Having a few weeks to waterfowl hunt without them is not asking too much...and may be the only solution for saving a dying tradition on Lake Champlain. It's sad and depressing, I would hunt considerably more than I do without the aggravation of bass tournaments.
- Vermont state should do more conservation work
- Veterans Day Hunting for Lake Champlain
- Want opening day in the middle of the week. Too many hunters on weekend.
- Wants the duck and geese season to go until the first of the year
- We do not have enough habitat to hold waterfowl here in northern Lake Champlain while migrating. The late birds go through without stopping.
- Weren't very many questions about New York areas specifically. I feel like that is leaving a lot of opinions out.
- When I was younger and hunting down in Addison County Down in dead Creek. By the goose reserve, they used to be. Approximately 33000 geese. Down on that reserve and I don't think that there's even a quarter of that number down there Anymore.
- Where I live and hunt, migratory geese don't come through it seems until late November. Can early goose season stay open with a bigger bag limit into October? Would reduce nuisance goose population. The new late season is hard because I don't know anyone with fields to hunt and the lake is usually frozen where I can access.
- Why do limit the questions on start dates to only weekends. Wednesday openings were
  great. The verbiage for your questions seem to be quite leading and only to collect or point
  to data points that are currently desired, leaving no room to learn the truth. This survey
  seems to just be used to defend a predetermined ways of thinking regarding waterfowl in
  Vermont. It does not collect data in a scientific manner, only a biased one, and one that
  keeps the bias in it
- With the seasons and bag limits being what they are for Canada geese, (too short, too low). i find it hard to believe that fish and game depts in the Lake Champlain area, have done actual counts in the fall. Populations are at an all-time super high number. 64 yrs of hunting

- tells me this. Also, local guides (2) have 90% of private lands on the northern NY side, leased and have all but eliminated places to hunt.
- Worried that bag limits are too liberal. Number of ducks seems to be down.
- You forgot to include the Hudson River zone in NY where I and others in southern VT hunt (I live in Bennington VT)!!!!
- Youth duck season prior to regular is a horrible idea, as ducks are known to be sensitive to pressure and will vacate an area when shot at. They push the birds out of the marshes and ponds, and the state keeps increasing the age of a "youth" hunter to now allow kids with drivers license to hunt. The single biggest issue I have with all youth hunting seasons is there is zero evidence they fulfill the initial reason for instating these seasons recruitment. Almost all "youths" hunt with parents or family members who already hunt they would have hunted anyway, just as was the traditions for decades. And "youth seasons" remove available ducks, turkey, deer, etc. from what was available for all prior to this. There is zero evidence of "youth season" recruitment, or would not have hunted "but for". End it, or at very least make maximum age something reasonable such as age 12
